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PREFACE.

It occours to us that one of the greatest defects in the elementary education of children, is, that so little effort is made to lead them to attach precise and distinct ideas to words.

Of what use are books to children, if they do not understand them? And how can they be enabled to understand books, if no effort is made to teach them the import of the words, and phrases, of which books are composed?

To accomplish this important object, some set the the little child to studying definitions. But the misfortune is, that, in most cases, the terms employed in the definition, themselves need defining, and without it, are as unintelligible to the child, as the original word to be defined. He is thus led into the unfortunate habit of merely ringing changes upon words, and thinking that he understands one word, because he knows how to substitute an imperfect synonyme in its stead.

Definitions are of little use in teaching very young children the meaning of words. But the language of pictures, which is the language of nature, known and understood by all men, may be used, in the accomplishment of this object, with great success, and to a vast extent, if judiciously employed, and if accompanied with a suitable corresponding effort, on the part of the teacher.

It is on these principles, that this little book has been prepared. It only remains, for the author briefly to point out the manner in which it should be used.

It is founded on these principles, of analysis and repetition. There is a series of pictures in the first part of the book, each of which is accompanied with a list of the names of the most prominent objects in the pictures, and also with a set of very short and

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simple phrases, illustrating the actions which the picture is intended to represent.

Let the child read over the list of names, and, then, let the teacher see if he can, without assistance, point out the objects in the picture, which the names denote. If the child meets with any difficulty in doing this, or needs any explanation, or illustration, let the teacher afford all necessary aid, and not stop until he is satisfied that the child has a good understanding of the whole.

In the same manner, go through with the phrases on the opposite page, being careful first to see, if the child, by the mere inspection of the picture, will not himself understand the ideas intended to be conveyed.


Part second consists of the same series of pictures, and in the same order, as in part first. But here, each of the pictures is accompained with a short story, the elements of which are to be found in the list of names, and in the sets of phrases in part first, accompanying the same picture. By having attended to these elements, which it would be very desirable briefly to review in each case, before reading the story, the child is now prepared, with the continued aid of the pictures, to read the story, and to understand it, with little if any aid from the teacher. He will do this, too, with an increased attention and interest.

The lists of names, and the sets of phrases, may be used for spelling lessons, and the stories, for reading lessons, with a whole class, either in infant, or in primary schools. And in addition to this, a very useful exercise may be pursued, by asking the class, in rotation, such questions as can receive a ready answer from the inspection of the pictures.


ELIJAH FED BY THE RAVENS.




THE WOOD-CUTTER.





A boy has come to the mill, to get a bag of corn ground. The boy has

alighted from his horse, and the bag is on the back of the horse. He is talking with the miller about grinding the corn. The boy does not hold the bridle, for the horse is very gentle, and stands quietly. The miller says he will grind the corn. He is going to help the boy to carry the bag of corn into the mill. In two days the boy will come again, on his horse to the mill. The corn will be ground and the boy will carry the meal to his father's house. His mother will make porridge and bake cakes of the meal. The house stands near that tall tree, a short distance up the stream, on the other side of the river. The boy's mother is standing at the door, waiting for him to come home from the mill.
